# From the Vice Principal's Desk

## **GUIDING OUR STUDENTS THROUGH THE WORLD OF AI**

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is no longer a distant concept - it is part of our students' everyday experience. Whether they are scrolling on TikTok, asking questions to a smart device, or using learning apps, AI is shaping the way they interact with the world. At The King's School West Rand, we recognise both the benefits and the challenges this technology brings, and we are committed to helping our students engage with it wisely and responsibly.

Al has the power to enhance education, offering quick access to information, personalised learning experiences, and even help with study skills. However, it also raises important concerns: Are students becoming too reliant on it? Will their critical-thinking and problem-solving skills suffer if Al can produce answers so easily? What impact do algorithmic biases and misinformation have on young minds still forming their understanding of truth and identity?

As a Christian school, we are especially mindful of how emerging technologies influence character development. Proverbs 4:7 reminds us, *"The beginning of wisdom is this: get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding."* It is not enough for our children to gain knowledge - they need discernment. Our role is to help them evaluate information critically, filter it through a Biblical lens, and use technology in a way that honours God and serves others.

Young children, especially those in the Foundation Phase, often view technology as something human-like. They may believe Al-powered tools "know" things or have feelings. Just as we teach them that cartoon characters aren't real, we need to reinforce that Al is a tool created by people - it is not alive, and it does not possess wisdom. We also need to be alert to the advertising and content embedded in the platforms they use, guiding their media exposure carefully and prayerfully.

This does not mean we shield our children from technology. Rather, we aim to introduce it in a safe and age-appropriate way. For example, some teachers may use smart assistants in class for quick definitions or spelling or to find teaching resources to include in their lesson plans, while still focusing on hands-on, sensory-based learning especially vital for younger students. *Technology can support education, but it should never replace the deep learning that happens through discussion, discovery, and real-world interaction.* 

As our students grow older, particularly in the high school phase, they become more sophisticated users of AI tools such as ChatGPT. These tools can be helpful when used well, but we also recognise the temptation they bring: to shortcut learning, copy assignments, or disengage from the process of thinking deeply. Our task as educators is not simply to monitor or restrict, but to teach. We want our students to understand AI's limitations - its potential for bias, its lack of context or emotional understanding, and its tendency to present confident but incorrect answers.

Teenagers, though naturally sceptical, often place undue trust in technology. Part of our teaching is to remind them that not everything generated by AI is reliable. We encourage them to ask questions like, "Is this true?", "Is this fair?", and "Does this align with God's Word?" Just as 1 Thessalonians 5:21 instructs us to "test everything; hold fast what is good," we want our students to apply this mindset to their use of AI.

We also cannot ignore the risks of misuse. As teens explore identity, relationships, and boundaries, they may lack the maturity to fully grasp the consequences of their actions. Generative AI can be used to create harmful or inappropriate content, such as fake images or cyberbullying materials, with devastating consequences. We must therefore continue to set firm guardrails, provide Biblical guidance, and engage in open conversations about ethical behaviour and personal responsibility.

At The King's School West Rand, we see AI as a tool - one that should be used thoughtfully, never to replace the wisdom and relationship that come from human interaction, and ultimately, from God. We continue to strengthen our digital literacy education, integrate critical-thinking strategies into our curriculum, and support our students as they navigate this changing world.

We do not yet know exactly what the future will look like. But what we do know is this: our children will need hearts grounded in truth, minds trained to think deeply, and character formed by God's Word. These are the qualities that will equip them, not just to use AI wisely, but to be a light in the world.

Let us continue to walk this journey together - staff and parents - as we prepare our children for a future filled with both promise and responsibility.




Not everyone has heat or shelter but we can share a little warmth. Knit a scarf, make a difference and give people some dignity this winter! We are blessed to be a blessing!
